Making Homes Warmer, Safer and Drier Transforming Lives

Your 2011 ASP Teams returned home safely in July, from a week of service in Mingo County, West Virginia. Working as part of Appalachia Service Project (ASP), a Johnson City, Tennessee-based home repair ministry, the groups helped to provide urgently needed home repairs to families in that area.

We will share a slide show and stories with our church family on **Sunday**, **November 13th** during the worship service, which will highlight the accomplishments of our 21 volunteers and their experiences while bonding with our ASP families.

Two of our teams, the Transformers and Mingo T's, worked together on one job site. Work was done on the outside of a trailer home where soffit and fascia were installed on the trim and T-111 to the gable. There were also drywall repairs made to the inside of the trailer.

St. John's Servants and the Mingo Maniac repaired and replaced windows & screens and painted the outside of a home purple with white trim.

Our teams were the last volunteers at this seven week center, which was something different for us. This presented a challenge of added responsibility since it is essential that the jobs that have been worked on for the six weeks prior to our arrival, must be finished by the end of our week. A really gratifying aspect of being the last week of volunteers is being present when the work projects are completed and seeing the part we played in improving the quality of life for our ASP families. We were able to experience the joy that is shared by the staff, volunteers, and families alike, knowing that ASP, with God's help, has been instrumental in making a positive difference in so many lives.

Along with finishing our home projects we also were needed to help do the final clean up and close the school where the volunteers and staff were housed during the summer. It is extremely important that everyone help out with these extra chores since it has a direct impact on whether ASP will be invited back to the same facility the following years. Securing facilities as summer centers can be a real challenge for ASP and so much depends on the last group of volunteers to do our part in enhancing ASP's positive reputation and influence within the community.

We thank St. John's, once again, for supporting, encouraging, assisting and praying for all of the volunteers. Your positive influence enables us to continue to serve more families every year.

We have already started planning our next mission trip the week of **July 23-28**, **2012**. Stayed tuned for more information.

On October 1, St. John's UMW received the highest awards given by United Methodist Women for its being a *Gold-Star Mission Today Unit*, as well as a *Six-Star Unit* by contributing to all six channels of Mission Giving. Jean Summers, president of St John's UMW, and Becky Gehl, UMW member, attended the "District Day" event at Sydenstricker UMC and accepted these noteworthy awards on behalf of St. John's UMW.

The Mission Today form is a guideline of suggested activities and programs for UMW units to follow as they strive to support the many mission focus areas ministered to marginalized people in society, particularly women and children. The activities range from "meeting Pledge to Mission" to "supporting hands-on mission activities" to "reading books from the UMW Reading Program." The 26 items listed on the Mission Today form are not new - they are mission activities the UMW and its foremothers have been doing for more than a century!

St. John's UMW members continue to fulfill their PURPOSE as UMW members through our continued support of mission programs. In recent months, several circles have cooked lunch meals for the homeless community served at Rising Hope United Methodist Mission Church. The UMW has provided backpacks and school supplies to elementary school children. They have kept up with timely readings offered by the UMW Reading Program on topics of leadership, missions, and spirituality. St. John's UMW made school and health kits for the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), which in turn delivered them to distressed areas in the US and around the world. UMW members attended seminars and workshops on society concerns such as immigration, and human trafficking. In addition to mission support, St. John's UMW has also held fundraisers to provide tuition scholarships for adult women 17 years or older.

A Note from the CELT

WW - John Wesley- D?

Then Jesus said to those Jews who believed Him, "If you abide in My word, you are My disciples indeed. And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." John 8:31-32

It has been said "Being a Christian is more than just an instantaneous conversion; it is a daily process whereby you grow to more and more like Christ." As followers of Christ, we strive to become more like Him through the way we live our lives each day.

How exciting to be assured that Jesus Christ knows us and wants to identify us as His disciples! Yet we know that being a disciple of Jesus is not an honorary title or designation. It represents a divine calling and carries with it a heavy responsibility. We are to abide in His Word, study His word, be set free by the truth of Jesus Christ, and do the work he calls us to do.

John Wesley was born in England in 1703 and was well-known as an itinerant Anglican minister, theologian, and the leader of Methodism. He made his decision to follow Jesus early and lived out his faith until his death at age 87. He placed love for God as the most important priority in his life and continually strived for perfection in serving Him, later in his life bringing about revival in England.

Wesley's "methodist" process involved the creation of small groups of people who came together regularly to study the Bible and share fellowship with each other in their faith walk. The small groups became the cornerstones for the Methodist societies that Wesley founded. "Sunday Schools" were eventually established to continue these small group teachings of Christ and Christian principles, as well as to sustain the fellowship that is so critical to nurturing the faith community.
